Set sail for the Edwardsville Public Library's Summer Reading Program – Make a Splash – Read! Children will explore the world of water through stories, songs, games and other activities about oceans, rivers, lakes, and pools and the creatures that live there. The Make a Splash – Read! Program is open to kids, from birth to 5th grade, with programs, prize drawings, story hours, a reading club, and more!



Teens are invited to "Make Waves at Your Library" this summer by participating in the Library's Teen Summer Reading Program, for grades 6-12. Teens can read for prizes as well as take part in special events offered throughout the summer, including: a capoeira class, a caricature art workshop, and a Wii Super Smash Brothers Brawl Gaming tournament!

Reading clubs begin on June 1 and end July 31. Stop in at the library to register and pick up a book bag and time log; or print off a time log online at www.edwardsvillelibrary.org and pick up a book bag later. As always, all kids' and teen programs are free of charge!

The themes for this year comes from the Collaborative Summer Library Program, which draws on ideas from libraries across the nation. Make a Splash-Read! artwork is by Henry Cole, and Make Waves at Your Library artwork is by Ursula Vernon, both authors and illustrators of many popular youth books.
