RESEARCHING YOUR DESTINATION

Desert USA (<http://www.desertusa.com/>)

This monthly Internet-based magazine is devoted to providing information about virtually any topic related to North American deserts. There are stories, pictures, virtual reality tours, movie and audio clips, and much factual information about desert animals, plants, cultural and natural history, recreation opportunities, parks, and travel.

Europe for Visitors (<http://europeforvisitors.com/>)

Travel Europe with "nearly 5,000 pages of articles, photos and links." There are country and city guides, information on accommodations and transportation, and practical advice on topics such as insurance, money, packing, smoking, travel with pets, and contact information for European national tourist offices.

Fodors.com (<http://fodors.com/>)

This travel publisher's website delivers an abundance of information for most, if not all, of your travel needs. Their destination overviews include sights and activities, hotels, restaurants, nightlife, the arts, shopping, itineraries, and smart travel tips. Additional travel resources include feature articles, tipping guides, language aids, photography tips, and travel talk forums where users post questions and share opinions.

Lonely Planet (<http://lonelyplanet.com/>)

This online companion to Lonely Planet's travel guidebooks lets you explore destinations around the world including some exotic and out-of-the-ordinary places. You can subscribe to a free monthly e-newsletter, *Comet*, participate in *Thorn Tree*, a discussion forum for travelers, and check out travel classifieds. Visit the *Bluelist* portion of the website to find out what travel experiences and destinations are recommended by fellow travelers and Lonely Planet staff. The site also features *Haystack*, which allows you to book reviewed and recommended accommodations online.

Forbes Travel Guide (<http://www.forbestravelguide.com/>)

Formerly the Mobil Travel Guide, the online version of these popular travel guides contains information on lodging, restaurants, and attractions across the United States and Canada.

ParkNet: The National Park Service (<http://www.nps.gov/>)

The official site of the U.S. National Park Service offers a listing of all National Park properties with a direct link to each park's web site. You'll find all of the information you need to visit any one of the parks, along with links to other relevant sites.

Rough Guides (<http://www.roughguides.com/>)

Visit this site for more worldwide country and city travel information from another well-known publisher of travel guides. You can choose your destination and read content from the relevant print Rough Guide. In most cases, you can click on "Basics" off to the side and get a list of additional topics (i.e., accommodation, eating and drinking, getting around) with more information and links to other sites.

If you're interested in combining travel and education check out this site. ShawGuides offers free online access to a database of more than 5,800 "career and recreational cooking schools, wine courses, golf & tennis schools & camps, high performance programs, writers conferences, photography, film & video workshops & schools, art & craft workshops, language vacations, cultural travel programs, and artists' and writers' residencies & retreats."

Specialty Travel Index (<http://www.spectrav.com/>)

This site offers tour and contact information for over 500 adventure tour operators around the world. Tours run the gamut from penguin viewing in the Arctic to covered wagon trips in Wyoming. You can search by destination and activity.

Trip Connect (<http://www.tripconnect.com/tripconnect/>)

Trip Connect is an online service that allows users to get travel advice and reviews from fellow travelers. The site can be searched by destination or hotel name. An added bonus are digital photos that some travelers post with their reviews. If you wish to post a review, you need to sign up for a free membership to the site.

HOW ARE YOU GETTING THERE?

Planes--

Air Travel Consumer Report (<http://airconsumer.ost.dot.gov/reports/index.htm>)

This monthly report from the U.S. Dept. of Transportation provides statistics on flight delays, mishandled baggage, overbookings, and consumer complaints.

Airlines of the Web (<http://flyaow.com/>)

Use this site to access links to 500 scheduled airlines around the world. Users can also book travel here through various travel companies.

Airwise Airport Guide (<http://www.airwise.com/airports/index.html>)

There's lots of useful information here about airports around the world. Find out about transportation to and from the airport, parking, car rental facilities, terminal information, and much more.

Expedia (<http://www.expedia.com/>)

Expedia is an online travel service for checking and booking flights, accommodations, car rentals, cruises, and vacation packages. A variety of travel deals are featured.

FlightArrivals.com (<http://www.flightarrivals.com/>)

Find the current status of any flight operating to/from/within the United States. You can search by airline and flight number, by city/airport in a 2-hour period, by airline/airport in a 6-hour period, and by airline with departure and arrival airports in a 16 hour period. You can also check airport status, which gives information on general delays and weather conditions at 71 U.S. airports.

Kayak (<http://www.kayak.com/>)

Kayak is a travel search engine that searches hundreds of other travel websites in real time looking for the best travel deals. You can sign up to receive free fare alerts via e-mail.

Orbitz (<http://www.orbitz.com/>)

Orbitz searches for the lowest airfares available for your itinerary, as well as offering deals on hotels, car rentals, cruises, and vacation packages. Free registration is only required at the point you make a reservation. "Orbitz' inventory now includes more than 400 airlines, more than 65,000 lodging properties worldwide, and 13 rental car brands."

Travelocity.com (<http://travelocity.com/>)

You can use this site to check airfares and schedules, make airline and train reservations, and book hotel rooms, cruises, and rental cars. There are destination guides with information from Frommer's guidebooks, as well as travelers' reviews of hotels and cruise ships. The site offers a variety of money-saving deals.

Trains—

Amtrak (<http://amtrak.com/>)

This is the website for U.S. passenger rail travel. You can check schedules and fares, make reservations, search savings and promotions, get baggage policies, and research destinations.

Railpass.com (<http://www.railpass.com/>)

A comprehensive source for European rail information. Various ticket plans are described along with prices and any special promotions. There is some schedule information available online and you receive a free Eurail timetable if you order a Pass online, but for complete scheduling information you'll need to check printed schedules such as the *Thomas Cook European Timetables*.

Cars—

America's Byways: National Scenic Byways Online (<http://www.byways.org/>)

If you're interested in finding the most scenic road trips in America, check out this site. You can search by state or road name to find interesting and beautiful roads to travel. There's an overview of each byway along with photos, maps and directions, places to visit, information about lodging, camping, food, gas stations, etc., and links to related sites. Check out the free map offer, too!

Mapquest (<http://www.mapquest.com/>)

Use this site to get driving directions in North American and Europe. You can generate maps by address, by city, by zip code or by airport. Mapquest no longer offers a road trip planner.

Rand McNally (<http://www.randmcnally.com/>)

This site allows you to get driving directions in the U.S., find a map, and plan a road trip. The road trip planner includes such useful features as things to do, places to stay, and a list of road construction projects in the U.S. and Canada that may affect your trip. Some maps on this site are available only with a paid Road Explorer membership.

Road Trip USA (<http://www.roadtripusa.com/>)

This online version of the book with the same name lets you choose route numbers or names "to access driving tours across more than 35,000 miles of classic blacktop." Learn about the towns and attractions (some very unique) along the way.

Buses—

Greyhound (<http://www.greyhound.com/>)

Visit Greyhound's virtual bus terminal to get fare and schedule information, information on special discounts, route maps, on-board information, links to Greyhound Canada and Greyhound Mexico, and more.

Boats—

Cruise Web (<http://cruiseweb.com/>)

Cruise Web is an official travel agency for the cruise industry. You can get lots of information about cruise lines, individual ship descriptions, photos and itineraries, port descriptions, price quotes, etc. Once you've selected your trip, you can book it online.

Search this worldwide listing of bed and breakfasts, historic hotels, small resorts and inns. Information includes address, phone number, photograph, and amenities. The site also includes recipes, hot deals, and message boards for reviews.

Find the Perfect Hotel Room (<http://www.tripkick.com/>)

If you are traveling to a large metro area or popular tourist destination, input your hotel name, and this site will let you know which rooms are quietest, have the best views, are larger, and more.

Lodging Guide World Wide (<http://www.lgww.com/>)

Billing itself as the "ultimate guide to lodging and accommodations," this comprehensive site allows you to search for hotels, motels, resorts, bed and breakfasts, and other lodgings worldwide. Search by city, postal code, and amenities.

Gasbuddy.com (<http://www.gasbuddy.com/>)

Chosen as one of the best 2007 websites by Newsweek, this website allow travelers to find high and low gas prices in any region of the U.S. If you register, you can also report prices. The site has a handy trip calculator that allows you to choose your vehicle, and selects the cheapest gas stations along your route.

This organization is the largest network of hostels in the U.S. Their site offers help planning your trip, links to other resources, and information about specific hostels including address and contact information, available facilities, prices, and nearby attractions.
